Advisory Neighborhood Commission 3A (“the Commission” or “ANC 3A”) is the newest ANC in Ward 3, serving approximately 10,000 residents in the northwest quadrant of the District of Columbia. The Commission area includes McLean Gardens, Cathedral Commons, parts of Cathedral Heights and north and west Cleveland Park, Berkshire-Greenbriar, Westover, Ward Circle, the federal Nebraska Avenue Complex (NAC), and south Tenley Circle.

ANC 3A was established as part of the process of DC Redistricting for Wards and ANCs following the 2020 decennial U.S. Census. It was formed from parts of ANC 3B, 3C, 3D, 3E and 3F, in the interest of reducing the size of some of those ANCs and providing a Commission to serve the Wisconsin Avenue corridor in the middle of Ward 3. The area has a strong concentration of residents in multi-family buildings, including in the new developments at City Ridge and Upton Place, who were not part of the 2020 Census but are served by the new ANC.

The five ANC 3A Commissioners were elected on a non-partisan basis in the General Elections in November 2022, for two-year terms. ANCs are the level of government closest to the people. Under District law, each ANC is assigned to hear and consult with community members through regular public meetings, to gather and share information, and to provide advice to the Mayor, executive agencies in the District, and the DC Council on issues affecting local residents and organizations.

**Lauching a new ANC**

During calendar year 2023, the ANC 3A Commissioners focused on:

- achieving effective start-up of the brand new ANC
- making connections with the local community, residents, institutions, and officials
- taking action in key areas where ANCs have primary responsibility
- creating a forum for members of the community to share comments and concerns
- sharing important information with constituents about District policies, programs and services

The ANC valued the participation of several hundred residents in its public meetings and discussions, as well as businesses and local non-profits, along with Ward 3 Councilmember Matthew Frumin, the Mayor’s office, Ward 3 State Board of Education member Eric Goulet, DC’s Shadow Representative to the U.S. House of Representatives Oye Owolewa, and multiple District agencies. Thanks also to the District’s Office of ANCs, and Commissioners from nearby ANCs for their support and assistance.

The District has never had so many new Advisory Neighborhood Commissions created in one year, and the new organizations faced a distinct challenge. When the Commissioners were sworn in on January 2, 2023, ANC 3A had no funds, no bank account, no email address or email list, no website, no officers, no bylaws, no meeting schedule or meeting site.

The early weeks and the first public meetings were largely devoted to organizing the Commission and getting all those elements put in place. The Office of ANCs and Commissioners in office in the previous term had been thinking ahead to how the process would work, so the new Commissions had guidance and support as well as some experienced Commissioners to assist. The DC Council also provided start-up funding for each new ANC, which was available when the official bank account was established. For the first 9 months through September 30, 2023, the District allotted a total of \$12,957.88 to support the work of ANC 3A. For the first quarter of FY2024 (October 1-December 31, 2023), the District provide an additional \$3,305.96. For the first year, the ANC focused on paying essential administrative expenses

## **About the ANC**

ANC 3A is the smallest Advisory Neighborhood Commission in Ward 3. The Commission has five members, each serving about 2,000 residents in the community. ANC constituents include people who live within the boundaries, as well as businesses and individuals who work in the Commission area.

By law, all meetings where at least a quorum of the ANC Commissioners convene to discuss or deliberate on issues for the ANC must be announced and must be open to the public. ANC 3A public meetings are typically held on the third Tuesday of each month. The date of the next meeting is posted on the ANC 3A website [www.anc3a.org](http://www.anc3a.org), along with the proposed agenda. Meetings are open to every member of the community. The Commission plans the meeting agendas to share information, discuss issues affecting the area, and develop recommendations to decision-makers involved in policies and programs in the District. Each public meeting also includes time for members of the community to share announcements and updates, raise issues, make comments, and ask questions. The Commission invites residents to suggest agenda items for future public meetings.

In addition to 11 regularly scheduled monthly meetings, the ANC 3A public meetings in 2023 included one special administrative meeting in early February and another special meeting in September to consider the two DC Department of Transportation (DDOT) Notices of Intent to move or remove Metrobus stops on the east side of Wisconsin Avenue at Macomb, Porter and Upton Streets, and take an official vote on a position in time for the due date for comments. (Special meetings are generally held to take up just one or a limited number of specific topics, but otherwise must follow all legal requirements for advance notice, open access for the public, minutes, and other standard parliamentary procedures.)

Through 2023, ANC 3A conducted all of its official business in the 13 public meetings of the Commission as a whole. The only way that an ANC can adopt an official position is to vote in a duly-noticed public meeting at which a quorum is present. (Three of the five Commissioners constitute a quorum.)

## **Organizing ANC 3A Meetings**

While most ANCs were still holding meetings entirely remotely after the COVID-19 emergency, from the beginning the ANC 3A Commissioners were committed to conducting ANC public meetings in person as well as available to people who wanted to participate remotely (a “hybrid” meeting format).

Several institutions in the Commission area have meeting space available, including several equipped with the technology to handle “virtual” or “hybrid” meetings. The ANC was very grateful that the National Presbyterian Church at Nebraska Avenue and Van Ness Street had recently completed renovations to its meeting spaces, with large screens and internet, and could accommodate the first five ANC 3A monthly public meetings. Through creativity and perseverance, the Commissioners were able to host guest speakers and meet with constituents in person and also allow people at home or in remote locations to participate fully, by connecting the screen to a laptop to manage the virtual meeting software and provide microphones, and a notebook computer to provide the camera and added speakers.

In June, the McLean Gardens Ballroom installed a 360° camera and later supplemented that with a second large video screen and microphones, at no extra cost to groups using the room. The remaining ANC 3A public meetings in 2023 have been held at that location, as “hybrid” meetings.

In its first year, the Commissioners have conducted the work of the ANC without staff support. The ANC 3A budget approved for FY 2023 and for FY 2024 allows funding to pay for part-time staff or contractors to support the Commission’s work, and also to manage committees, so that could be done in the future. To date, ANC 3A has not established standing committees, special committees, or task forces as some ANCs have done, which hold discussions outside of the Commission monthly meetings, research local issues, and develop recommendations for the ANC.

## **Engaging constituents and keeping the community informed**

One of the major responsibilities of an ANC is to hear from residents and others in the Commission area, share public views with other local officials and also share information with the public about recent development as well as District policies, programs and services. The primary way that ANC 3A carries out that function is to provide updates and announcements at each public meeting, host presentations, and hold public discussions about issues affecting the Commission area.

To start the year, newly elected Ward 3 Councilmember Matthew Frumin joined the ANC at its first public meeting to welcome the new Advisory Neighborhood Commission and constituents and hear their interests and concerns. Councilmember Frumin also participated in three other meetings, speaking about housing, education, public safety, and other major issues for the community. The Councilmember's staff along with Matthew Barclay of the Mayor's Office of Community Relations and Services participated in ANC 3A public meetings through the rest of the year and provided announcements of local activities and updates on issues of interest.

The initial ANC 3A public meeting in January 2023 also included a chance for residents to ask questions of the Commissioners and highlight issues they hoped would be pursued in future meetings. Under District law, every ANC regularly scheduled public meeting must include time for residents to share comments and raise topics of interest or concern, and the new Commission follows that requirement. At ANC 3A public meetings throughout the year, discussions among Commissioners and residents covered numerous public issues and included an open forum for residents to make comments and ask questions.

The most frequent topic of discussion at ANC 3A public meetings in 2023 was transportation and particularly safety, including safer sidewalks for pedestrians as well as safer options for those using bicycles and other micromobility devices. During the year DDOT also announced several local projects which did not provide for ANC comment but were the subject of announcements and open to public comment, including a new Capital Bikeshare station at Massachusetts Avenue and Idaho Avenue and the first "ground mural" installed in Ward 3 as part of DDOT's "Art-in-the Right-of-Way" program. Also bordering ANC 3A, DDOT opened the first protected bike lanes in Ward 3, on New Mexico Avenue and Tunlaw Road between Nebraska Avenue and Calvert Street, which were completed in October 2023.

Other subjects of discussion at meetings in 2023 related to education, housing, vacant properties, public utilities, social services and behavioral health, services for seniors, as well as crime and public safety.

ANC 3A is part of MPD's Second District, including portions of Sectors 1 and 2, and four Police Service Areas (PSAs) 202, 203, 204, and 205), though most of the area is in PSA 204. At the beginning of 2023, the Second District welcomed Commander John Branch as its new leader. At most ANC 3A public meetings, officers from the Second District presented a monthly community report on public safety and crime statistics and heard questions and concerns from meeting participants. The Commissioners appreciated the opportunity to work with several local MPD Captains during the year including Captain Ron Bridges, Captain Tatjana Savoy, Captain Darren Haskis, and Captain Shardé Harris. In November 2023, Captain Savoy was named the new Second District Commander.

In 2023 the ANC had 15 presentations by local officials and other individuals covering a range of issues and topics affecting residents and businesses in the community. See the full list below.

Each ANC is also responsible for monitoring zoning cases, applications for alcoholic beverage licenses, or local projects in the individual Commission area that are coming before the DC Historic Preservation Office for review; notifying residents; and offering opportunities for residents and other affected parties to learn about those matters, share comments and questions, and participate in discussions with the ANC.

At public meetings in 2023, ANC 3A had presentations about 11 specific cases including 4 applications for stipulated alcoholic beverage licenses for new establishments planning to open in the area, 5 zoning

cases being heard by the Board of Zoning Adjustment, and 2 projects that were undergoing concept review by the DC Historic Preservation Board.

## **ANC Actions**

During the first year, ANC 3A took action on numerous issues, including administrative actions as well as substantive issues on which the Commission heard presentations and held deliberations.

The ANC adopted 25 resolutions dealing with issues from school funding to transportation safety to specific positions on zoning cases and liquor licenses.

Highlights included:

- a chance to meet and speak with Georgia B. Ellard, retired Superintendent of Rock Creek Park and the first woman and first Black woman to hold that position, and recommend that Reservation 630 bordering ANC 3A be named in her honor;
- a resolution on the Washington Gas Light (WGL) PROJECTpipes, the 40-year program for accelerated replacement of aging and leaking gas pipes in the District, which WGL has asked the DC Public Service Commission to approve for a third phase at a cost of \$672 million over the next five years. After hearing presentations by WGL and the DC Office of People's Counsel (OPC), the ANC voted to support OPC's position calling for a pause on PROJECTpipes;
- resolutions presenting comprehensive comments on WMATA's "Better Bus Initiative" and a draft map of potential changes in local bus routes for the future, and also urging improved bus and other transportation options for the new DCPS high school on MacArthur Boulevard;
- an information forum sponsored jointly with ANC 3E to let the community find out more about the DC Office of Planning proposed Draft Development Guidelines for Wisconsin Avenue, and subsequent vote on ANC comments;
- votes to support projects on two historic properties that were going to the District's Historic Preservation Board for concept review;
- votes to support four applications from new establishments in ANC 3A applying for stipulated liquor licenses so they could open with the requested food and beverage service.

### PRESENTATIONS

Welcome and Presentation by Ward 3 Councilmember Matthew Frumin (1/23)

Presentation by Eric Goulet, newly elected member of DC State Board of Education for Ward 3, who spoke about his policy initiatives including defeating proposed cuts in funding for local schools, keeping school funding in line with inflation in costs, expanding capacity for Stoddert Elementary, finding another site for an elementary school in northern Ward 3, and promoting options for the District of Columbia government to pursue purchase or long-term lease of the private Whittle School campus which closed in July 2022 (the former Intelsat headquarters at Connecticut Avenue between Tilden Street and Van Ness Street) which he advocated for use by DC schools. (2/23)

Presentation by DC Office of Campaign Finance about public financing for election campaigns for candidates running for elected office in the District (other than ANC candidates) (2/23)

Presentation by Abigail Demopoulos of Cleveland Park Smart Growth about the need for improved bus service on Wisconsin Avenue (2/23)

Presentation about the concept and detailed designs for American University's proposed Alan and Amy Meltzer Center for Athletic Performance and the nearby Sports Center Annex (SCAN) at the western edge of the AU campus (3/23 and 6/23). Cory Peterson, American University Assistant Vice President for Community and Government Relations, Office of People and External Affairs, participated in three ANC 3A meetings to share the plans for the project, which involves Areas 3 and 5 of the AU Campus Plan approved by the DC Zoning Commission in 2021. He also spoke about the measures AU had developed to mitigate potential impacts of the project on residents of University Terrace, such as noise

and light pollution. ANC 3A is one of the three ANCs that adjoin or include portions of AU in the Commission area, and were considered automatic parties to the case.

Presentation about the Psychiatric Institution of Washington (PIW) at 4228 Wisconsin Avenue NW in ANC 3A. PIW is one of the only organizations in the District that provides inpatient and outpatient psychiatric care and treatment. From before the launch of ANC 3A, Chair Thaddeus Bradley-Lewis was working with PIW, its new officials, nearby businesses, and residents on concerns including improved communication and public safety for clients and others as well as location of parking for ambulances serving the location, as well as transportation and other services for clients leaving PIW. Presentation by DC Public Schools (DCPS) Chancellor Lewis Ferebee about the Mayor's Proposed Budget for Fiscal Year 2024, with specific focus on the budget and school investment plans for DCPS and public schools in Ward 3 (4/23)

Presentation by staff of the Smart Streetlight Program on the new DC plan to replace all street lights on public streets and alleys with LED lights that are centrally monitored and controlled and can be adjusted for brightness and shielding (4/23)

Presentation on programs and services of the DC Office of Tenant Advocate (4/23)

Update from Beau Finley, Chief Enforcement Officer, DC Department of Licensing and Consumer Protection (DLCP), formerly part of DCRA, about the District's new prohibition on flavored tobacco products, including menthol, as well as sale of e-cigarettes or other smoking devices within ¼ mile of a public, charter or private middle school or high school and sharing a list of local establishments covered by the rules (4/23)

Introduction of Georgia B. Ellard, retired Superintendent of Rock Creek Park, and presentation about her work for the National Park Service (NPS) as the first woman Superintendent and first Black woman superintendent, the foundation for the recommendation for naming Reservation 630 after her (6/23)

Presentation by Christian Piñeiro, DC Department of Transportation (DDOT) Community Engagement Specialist for Ward 3, about DDOT's system for prioritizing DC 311 requests for traffic safety improvements as part of the "TSI 2.0" process launched in January 2023 (6/23)

Presentations about the Washington Gas Light (WGL) "PROJECTpipes" which was designed to repair or replace aging or leaking gas pipes to provide gas distribution service to WGL customers in the District. Anne deBuys, local resident and environmental advocate, spoke about environmental and health effects of natural gas and the relationship between use of natural gas and the chances to achieve District energy and environmental goals of reducing greenhouse gas emissions, curbing climate change, and shifting to using electricity in homes and buildings instead of fossil fuels such as natural gas and its main component, methane. Resolution responding to DDOT NOI 23-231-PSD – a proposal to install a new micromobility corral in the 3700 block of Fulton Street NW for parking bikes and scooters, in what has been the first RPP parking space on the south side of the street west of Wisconsin Avenue -- urging DDOT to remove several parking spaces on the north side of Fulton Street opposite that location before proceeding with installing a micromobility corral, to ensure safety for pedestrians and vehicles (11/23)

Resolution supporting the DDOT NOI 23-237-TOA to change the one remaining two-hour on-street parking space in front of the Crestview Condominiums at 3601 Wisconsin Avenue, where DDOT installed a new Metrobus stop in October, removing the previous loading zone and three other two-hour parking spaces (12/23)

Resolution to support the DC Office of People's Counsel request to the DC Public Service Commission to put a pause on Washington Gas Light's PROJECTpipes (12/23)

#### ADMINISTRATIVE VOTES

The Commission took a number of votes to establish the framework for managing the new ANC and meeting the legal requirements in DC Code. All official decisions must be made at public meetings that are open and accessible to the public, at which a quorum of the Commissioners are participating. Under legislation adopted during the COVID-19 emergency, ANCs can hold meetings virtually and Commissioners can participate in meetings remotely, be counted as part of a quorum, and cast votes by virtual technology.

At the initial ANC 3A public meeting on January 26, 2023, held in Meeting Room 109 on the ground level at National Presbyterian Church, Van Ness Street at the corner of Nebraska Avenue, and also virtually, the Commission voted to approve:

At the February 13, 2023, Special Administrative Meeting, held virtually, the Commission voted to approve:

- Holding public meetings at National Presbyterian Church through March 2023

- Expenditure for online web development software and templates from Go Daddy (also handling payment for the domain name for the ANC 3A website)

- Expenditure for Zoom Pro Account to conduct ANC 3A virtual meetings

- Appointment of Commissioner Jeremy Del Moral as the ANC 3A Representative to the American University Neighborhood Partnership

At the March public meeting, the ANC voted to amend the FY 2023 budget approved in January 2023 and the subsequent vote in February 2023 allowing expenditure for a Zoom Pro account, in order to provide sufficient funds to cover a Zoom Business account which would provide for both recording and transcription of the ANC 3A public meetings.

In March 2023, the ANC also voted to hold two additional monthly public meetings at National Presbyterian Church in April and May, and then review options and make a decision on the location of subsequent public meetings. In May 2023, the ANC voted to hold the remaining public meetings of calendar year 2023 at the McLean Gardens Ballroom at 3811 Porter Street, which has capacity for hybrid meetings and does not charge a rental fee for groups that have an affiliation with the McLean Gardens community.

In June 2023, the ANC voted to approve an application to OANC to request use of funds from the Technical Assistance Fund for purchase of an official laptop for use in conducting ANC public meetings.

In July 2023, the ANC adopted Standard Operating Procedures for ANC 3A Committees and Task Forces.

In December 2023, the ANC voted to extend the agreement with the McLean Gardens Ballroom to hold ANC 3A public meetings at that location in 2024.

The ANC also voted to continue to schedule monthly ANC 3A public meetings on the third Tuesday of the month, through January 2025, except in May when the meeting is scheduled for the second Tuesday, May 14, and approved the proposed meeting schedule for the following 13 months.
