ANC 6C Annual Report 2021

ANC 6C, in order to meet the requirements of Section 1.309-10(n-1) of the Code of the District of Columbia, reports that during the twelve months preceding December 1, 2021, it did the following:

- Held eleven public meetings of the commission, all on the WebEx platform;
- Afforded an opportunity at these meeting for brief community announcements from members of the public, government officials, and representatives of various organizations;
- Benefited from the work of commissioners and 6C residents who served on the five 6C committees: Alcoholic Beverage Licensing; Environment, Parks and Events; Grants; Planning, Zoning and Economic Development; and Transportation and Public Space.
- Protested 9 applications for alcoholic beverage licenses or renewals;
- Acted with respect to 4 other alcoholic beverage license applications;
- Considered other alcoholic beverage licensing issues, including requests for smoking exemptions and lack of enforcement of hour of operation requirements;
- Submitted recommendations on matters of concern to the Mayor and the Council of the District of Columbia and to agencies and departments of the District of Columbia, including at least 8 to the Mayor or Council; 7 to the Zoning Commission; 3 to the Historic Preservation Review Board; 17 to the Board of Zoning Adjustment; 29 to the District Department of Transportation; and 10 to other District offices;

- Provided testimony to federal officials concerning the proposed Maglev project between the District and Baltimore;
- Designated commissioners or committee members to represent ANC 6C in at least 34 hearings, meetings or proceedings;
- Awarded a grant of \$3000 to Capitol Hill Montessori at Logan for a Story of Our Schools project;
- Monitored regularly the development of parks and open spaces in NoMa, as well as the condition and maintenance of parks throughout the ANC 6C area, in particular Stanton Park; and
- Posted agendas, minutes and reports of its meetings and committee meetings, and copies of its correspondence, as well as information on items of interest, on a timely basis, on its website.

ANC 6C in the twelve months preceding December 1, 2021, has been particularly concerned about the impact of the pandemic on the residents of Washington, D.C.; the ramifications of the January 6, 2021, attack on the U.S. Capitol; new security measures adopted by the Supreme Court; the need for affordable housing in the District; the encampments below the underpasses in NoMa and along the 200 and 300 blocks of Massachusetts Avenue NE; safety improvements on District roadways for pedestrians and bicyclists; the design of the intersection at New York and Florida Avenues NE (Dave Thomas Circle); illegal marijuana retail establishments, crime, and other quality of life issues on H Street NE; proposed regulations or legislation applying to accessory dwelling units, rooftop structures, school parking zones, commercial parking and loading zones, abandoned vehicles, and marijuana licensing; spikes of carjacking and vehicle theft within the ANC 6C area; enforcement of parking regulations in public space and on residential parking

permit blocks; and developments associated with the proposed Union Station expansion project.
