Greetings from Commission ANC 5D,

This year has been one of both challenges and resilience for ANC 5D. In a time marked by economic uncertainty, job loss, and a variety of transitions, our Commission has worked to ensure that residents remain supported, informed, and connected. Despite these headwinds, ANC 5D has continued to make meaningful progress through policy advocacy, hands-on community action, and neighborhood collaboration.

Across Carver-Langston, Trinidad, Ivy City, Gallaudet, Union Market, and the broader Ward 5 corridor, we have strengthened our collective community through consistent engagement, thoughtful planning, and shared purpose.

Our focus this year has been on open communication, responsible development, and tangible community impact. Committees have taken on complex zoning issues, addressed infrastructure and sanitation needs, and continued the important work of environmental stewardship.

Even in a challenging environment, ANC 5D has remained a steady advocate for residents. Through collaboration with Councilmembers, District agencies, community partners, and neighbors, we have hosted cleanups, supported local initiatives, awarded community grants, and created opportunities for connection and renewal.

Together, we have demonstrated that when our community faces difficult times, we rise to meet them stronger, more united, and committed to the well-being of every resident.

Commission Overview

Commission Area 5D is currently divided into nine Single-Member Districts (SMDs), each electing a single Commissioner to serve on the Commission. Commissioners are given special deference by Commission procedures on matters within their respective SMDs.

Together, we Commissioners represent the diverse and vibrant neighborhoods of Union Market, Ivy City, Trinidad, Carver-Langston, and Gallaudet, each contributing our time and expertise to improving the quality of life for all ANC 5D residents.

Report Purpose

This report is responsive to two provisions of the DC Code pertaining to Advisory Neighborhood Commission (ANC) governance.

Per DC Code § 1–309.10(n-1):

By December 1 of each year, each Commission shall publish an annual report or newsletter that summarizes the activities of the Commission in service to the community over the preceding 12 months, including a highlighting of key issues voted upon, comments submitted to District agencies, and issuance of community grants.

Per DC Code § 1–309.10(j)(1):

On or before November 30 of each year, each Commission may file an annual report with the Council and the Mayor for the preceding fiscal year. Such report shall include, but shall not be limited to:

- (A) Summaries of important problems perceived by the Commission in order of their priority;
- (B) Recommendations for actions to be taken by the District government;
- (C) Recommendations for improvements on the operation of the Commissions;
- (D) Financial report; and
- (E) A Summary of Commission activities.

In combining these provisions, this report covers the 12 months preceding December 1, 2025 (December 1, 2024 through November 30, 2025) and/or the preceding fiscal year (October 1, 2024 through September 30, 2025). As a result, this document aims to comprehensively summarize ANC 5D's work and achievements between October 1, 2024, and November 30, 2025, to the extent possible.

Commission Activities Summary

Over the past 12 months, ANC 5D has remained committed to serving the community through advocacy, engagement, and strategic action. This section provides a summary of the Commission’s work, highlighting the key areas where we have made an impact for residents across all Single Member Districts.

Key Votes and Decisions:

- Reviewed and voted on a variety of zoning and development cases, supporting projects that provide community benefit and opposing proposals that did not align with neighborhood priorities.
- Addressed public safety, infrastructure, and environmental issues, ensuring that resident concerns were incorporated into decision-making.
- Approved allocations for community grants, events, and neighborhood improvement initiatives that strengthen the local quality of life.

Comments and Advocacy Submitted to District Agencies:

- Submitted formal comments to MPD, DC Council, DDOT, DPR, DOEE, WMATA, and other District agencies on issues including traffic safety, environmental justice, development projects, and public amenities.
- Advocated for resident priorities in city planning processes, ensuring that proposals considered the impact on quality of life, accessibility, and neighborhood character.
- Engaged with city agencies on programs including stormwater management, tree planting and environmental equity, reinforcing ANC 5D’s commitment to a sustainable and healthy community.

Community Grants and Investments:

- Issued grants to local initiatives that promote neighborhood engagement, cultural celebration, and economic opportunity, including:

- Trinidad Day Festival – Celebrating neighborhood culture and community connections.
- Trinidad Farmers Market History and Future Festival – Supporting small vendors and local commerce.
- Trinidad Mural on the Boxing Gym – Highlighting local heritage and arts.
- Historian Project – Preserving ANC 5D history and cultural memory for future generations.
- Operational Support – ANC 5D hired contractors to provide administrative assistance and social media and communications support, ensuring the Commission’s operations remain efficient, responsive, and accessible to residents.

Through these activities, ANC 5D has sought to strengthen community ties, enhance neighborhood livability, and ensure that residents’ voices remain central to local governance. This summary captures the Commission’s dedication to transparency, accountability, and actionable outcomes over the past year.

Financial Overview

ANC 5D maintained a strong financial position throughout FY2025, ensuring accountability, transparency, and strategic use of resources.

Key Highlights:

- Prudent Management: Careful oversight of operational funds ensured that expenditures aligned with Commission priorities.
- Strategic Investments: Funding was allocated to community grants, public events, and initiatives that directly benefit residents.
- Commission Maintenance: Funding was allotted to office costs like the Verizon Internet, Wix, Mailchimp, neighborhood cleanup tools, and items that directly assist Commissioners with daily Commission activities.
- Operational Support: ANC 5D hired contractors to provide administrative assistance and social media and communications support, ensuring the Commission’s operations remain efficient, responsive, and accessible to residents. Both supporting roles pay \$27 per hour and roles are capped at \$750 per month.
- Digital Tracking: Continued use of online OANC tools and reporting systems allowed for transparent monitoring of budgets and spending.

Community Grants

This year, ANC 5D awarded grants to support initiatives that enhance neighborhood life and foster community engagement:

- Trinidad Day Festival – Celebrating neighborhood culture and community connections. We provided a \$4,700 grant to the Washington Conservatory of Music for the festival.
- Trinidad History and Future Fest – We provided a \$2,500 grant to the Trinidad Farmers Market for the event. The Wheatley School Community Organization was the focus of this year's festival.
- Trinidad Mural on the Boxing Gym – Funding helped bring this community artwork to life, celebrating local heritage and athletic achievement. We provided an \$8,000 direct expenditure for the mural project.
- Historian Project – Supporting the documentation of ANC 5D's history, preserving local stories, milestones, and cultural heritage for future generations. We provided a \$6,400 direct expenditure for the Historian Project. \$3,200 was paid to begin the project and \$3,200 will be paid upon completion of the project.

Looking Ahead

As we plan for FY2026, the Commission is considering the re-establishment of a Grants Committee. This committee would help review grant applications, ensure equitable distribution of funds, and provide residents with an opportunity to participate in the decision-making process for community funding.

Zoning & Development Committee

The Zoning and Development Committee played a central role this year in reviewing cases that shape the future of ANC 5D. The Committee sought to balance the need for affordable housing, community benefit, and neighborhood character.

ANC 5D also reviewed cases where concerns about scale, community impact, or process transparency led to opposition or a decision to withhold support. A detailed listing of these cases is available in Appendix A of this report.

Community Engagement and Education

The Committee continues to work toward greater transparency and resident participation in zoning and planning discussions. Through regular updates at ANC meetings and ongoing communication with developers, we aim to ensure that residents' voices are heard early and often in the decision-making process.

How Residents Can Get Involved:

- Attend Committee Meetings: Join monthly zoning meetings (posted on the ANC 5D website and social media) to learn about upcoming cases and share your feedback.
- Stay Informed: Review current zoning applications and updates through the DC Office of Zoning's Interactive Zoning Information System (IZIS) or ANC 5D meeting agendas.
- Share Input: Email your Commissioner with questions or concerns about proposed developments in your Single Member District.
- Participate in Community Walkthroughs: When major developments are proposed, the Committee often conducts on-site visits — residents are encouraged to attend and provide input.
- Collaborate on Long-Term Planning: Help shape the future of ANC 5D by contributing ideas for the Comprehensive Plan and neighborhood design goals.

The Zoning & Development Committee remains committed to thoughtful, inclusive, and balanced growth, ensuring that development benefits current residents while preparing the community for the future.

Trash & Beautification Committee

The Trash and Beautification Committee made major strides this year in promoting a cleaner, greener, and more unified ANC 5D. From community cleanups to new partnerships, the committee's work has focused on building neighborhood pride and improving quality of life for all residents.

Accomplishments:

- Neighborhood Cleanups: Hosted a record number of cleanup events across all Single Member Districts — collecting nearly 1,200 bags of trash. For most of our cleanups we partnered with CSOSA, providing people in the criminal justice system with a convenient way to get their work hours, and providing the committee with greatly needed extra hands.
- Roll-Off Days: Partnered with the Department of Public Works (DPW) to host multiple *Community Roll-Off Days*, giving residents free access to large disposal containers for bulk trash and debris. These events help to reduce illegal dumping and improve overall neighborhood appearance.
- Tree Walks: Organized several *Tree Walks* in partnership with DDOT Division of Urban Forestry to educate residents about tree care, native species, and urban greenery. Planted and/or replaced at least 50 trees, and helped highlight tree issues through the neighborhood.
- Beautify 5D Campaign: Working on many initiatives – encouraged residents and businesses to adopt a block; started efforts with DC Natives to plant wildflower gardens and mini community gardens on resident's property between the sidewalk and the street, which will

also attract more native pollinators; started discussions around creating a food forest at the Trinidad Rec Center; and supported the maintenance of green spaces throughout the year.

- Partnerships: Worked closely with DPW, DOEE, and community organizations to address recurring trash concerns, coordinate alley cleanups, and install new litter cans in high-traffic areas.

Looking Ahead

Next year, the Committee will host a *Garden Walk in collaboration with DC Natives*, showcasing some of the most beautiful and creative resident gardens across ANC 5D. The event will celebrate neighborhood pride, sustainability, and community connection while inspiring others to take part in greening efforts.

How Residents Can Get Involved:

- Join a Cleanup: Volunteer for monthly or seasonal cleanups — all cleanups are open to residents, families, and community groups.
- Adopt Your Block: Take part in the *Beautify 5D* initiative by maintaining your block or other streets or blocks. Plant flowers, pick up litter, and help care for trees and planters near your home.
- Attend a Committee Meeting: Share ideas, suggest cleanup locations, or discuss neighborhood beautification priorities. Meetings are posted on ANC 5D's website and social media.
- Host or Sponsor a Roll-Off Day: Work with your Commissioner to bring a bulk trash disposal event to your area, reducing illegal dumping and improving community cleanliness.
- Participate in a Garden Walk or Tree Walk: Learn more about native plants, urban gardening, and tree care — and showcase your own garden for others to enjoy.

The Trash and Beautification Committee welcomes everyone — whether you have five minutes or a full afternoon to give — because every effort helps make ANC 5D a cleaner and more beautiful place to live.

Environmental Justice Committee

The Environmental Justice Committee continued its mission to ensure that every ANC 5D resident benefits from a healthy, sustainable, and equitable environment. The committee focused on improving air and water quality, advancing green infrastructure, and promoting resident engagement in environmental decision-making.

Accomplishments:

- Green Infrastructure & Stormwater Management: Partnered with the Department of Energy and Environment (DOEE) to expand education on the benefits of rain gardens, permeable pavement, and stormwater control features in high-impact areas.
- Advocacy for Accountability: Worked with District agencies to strengthen *noise control, air quality monitoring in Ivy City, and truck routes through neighborhood enforcement* to help protect residential areas from environmental harm. More work and collaboration is needed with our Energy and Environmental agency.
- Community Education: Brought residents and city agencies together in Ivy City to discuss environmental equity, resilience, and neighborhood-based solutions for the Ivy City Climate Resilience Strategy Plan sponsored by DOEE.

How Residents Can Get Involved:

- Join a Committee Meeting: Residents are encouraged to attend Environmental Justice Committee meetings to share environmental concerns, ideas, or project proposals upon interest of the committee. *This Committee meets on an ad-hoc basis.*
- Report Environmental Concerns: Use DC 311 or contact your Commissioner to report illegal dumping, idling trucks, or pollution-related issues in your area.
- Participate in Tree and Garden Initiatives: Help plant and maintain trees or native gardens that improve air quality and reduce stormwater runoff.
- Attend the Environmental Justice in Action Forum and or DOEE Stakeholder meetings: Join the annual event to connect with neighbors, District agencies, and organizations focused on sustainability and equity. Check out [DOEE.gov](https://doee.dc.gov) for quarterly community meetings, and sign up to get on the listserv.
- Volunteer for a Project: From storm drain labeling to composting workshops, residents can play a hands-on role in improving local environmental health.
- Learn and Share: Follow ANC 5D communications for updates on city programs like Solar for All, energy rebates, or green job opportunities — and help spread awareness in your community.

The Environmental Justice Committee welcomes all residents — whether you're passionate about trees, air quality, or climate resilience to help make ANC 5D a model for sustainability and environmental justice in the District.

Transportation Committee

The Transportation Committee worked to improve mobility, safety, and accessibility across ANC 5D. With the growing number of residents, visitors, and development projects in our neighborhoods, transportation continues to be a top priority for ensuring that every mode of travel — whether by car, bus, bicycle, or on foot — is safe, equitable, and efficient.

Key Highlights and Accomplishments:

- **Traffic Safety and Calming:** Collaborated with the District Department of Transportation (DDOT) to advocate for new speed humps, all-way stop signs, and improved crosswalk visibility at key intersections throughout the Commission area.
- **Public Transit Advocacy:** Provided community feedback to DDOT regarding bus stop placement, service reliability, and pedestrian safety near major routes including Florida Avenue, Bladensburg Road, and Benning Road.
- **Bike and Pedestrian Infrastructure:** Supported sidewalk repairs and curb ramp updates to enhance accessibility for residents with mobility challenges. Also advocated for DDOT to review the timing of lights along the 17th St NE corridor and to review the placement of shared mobility vehicles (Bikes, Scooters, etc).
- **Parking and Curbside Management:** Engaged with residents and DDOT on Residential Permit Parking (RPP) concerns, loading zone access, and enforcement issues around new development areas.

Looking Ahead

In the year ahead, the Transportation Committee will continue to prioritize safe streets and connected communities. The Committee plans to:

- Host neighborhood transportation safety walks to identify traffic and infrastructure concerns.
- Advocate for expanded multi-modal options, including better bus connectivity and micro-mobility solutions.
- Strengthen communication between DDOT, residents, and ANC 5D to ensure that transportation projects reflect community priorities.

How Residents Can Get Involved:

- **Attend Committee Meetings:** Residents are encouraged to join monthly Transportation Committee meetings to provide input on traffic, parking, and transit concerns.

- Report Issues: Use DC 311 or contact your Commissioner to report street hazards, broken signals, or safety concerns in your area.
- Participate in Safety Walks: Join organized neighborhood walks to identify and discuss areas needing traffic calming, crosswalk improvements, or pedestrian upgrades.
- Advocate for Transit Needs: Share your experiences with public transportation or micro-mobility services to help the Committee advocate for improvements with WMATA and DDOT.

The Transportation Committee remains committed to promoting a safer, more accessible, and sustainable transportation network for all who live, work, and travel in ANC 5D, and actively welcomes resident participation in shaping solutions for our neighborhoods.

Community Highlights

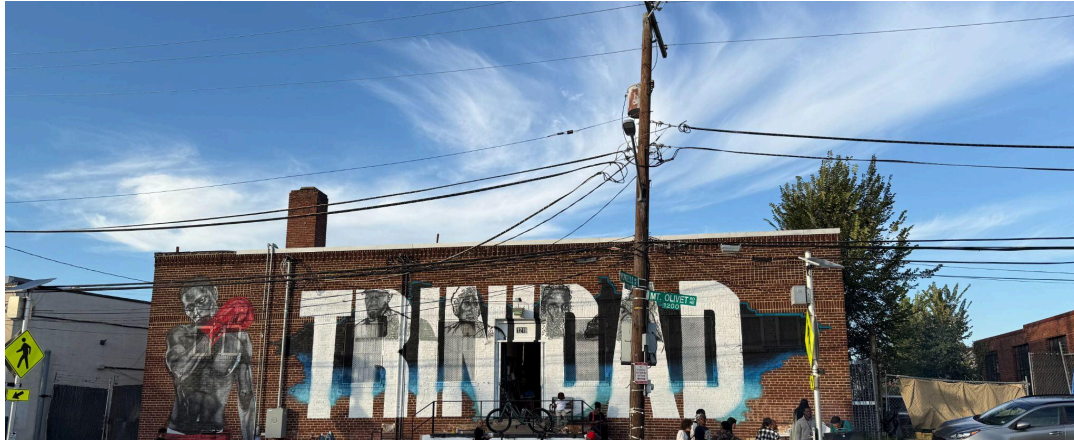
This section highlights some of the vibrant community projects, events, and initiatives that made ANC 5D a stronger, more connected, and engaged neighborhood this year.

Featured Projects and Highlights:

- Community Cleanups and Roll-Off Days: Volunteers helped clean nearly every street across all Single Member Districts, keeping neighborhoods safe and beautiful.



- Trinidad Mural on the Boxing Gym: A new mural celebrating local heritage and athletic excellence was completed at the Trinidad Boxing Gym, bringing art and community pride to the heart of the neighborhood.



- Tree Walks and Garden Initiatives: Residents participated in tree walks, native plantings, and beautification efforts that enhanced green space and environmental awareness.



- Historian Project: Documenting the stories, milestones, and rich history of ANC 5D neighborhoods, this project preserved local heritage while engaging residents of all ages in community storytelling.

- Festivals and Community Events: From the Trinidad Day Festival to local farmers' markets, ANC 5D supported events that brought residents together and celebrated neighborhood culture. Ivy City sponsored several workshops for the Ivy City Climate Resilience Strategy Plan for the community, and continued celebrating Alexander Crummell with a Crummell Saint Day in September/October every year.

Wheatley: Segregation, Integration, and Growth

In the early 1950s, Washington, D.C. schools were strictly segregated by race. Black students often attended overcrowded and underfunded "colored" schools, while white students were provided newer facilities and greater resources. This unequal system sparked local activism that mirrored the national struggle for civil rights.

In 1952, Bishop Smallwood Williams—a prominent minister and civil rights leader—and his 5-year-old son Wallace challenged that system directly. When the D.C. Board of Education reassigned Wallace from Young Elementary, a Black school, to the all-white Wheatley Elementary School to relieve crowding, the Williams family attempted to enroll him. Despite being turned away, their sit-in protest at Wheatley drew citywide attention and became an early public challenge to school segregation in the District.

This act of resistance occurred just two years before the landmark *Bolling v. Sharpe* decision (1954), the companion case to *Brown v. Board of Education*, which declared segregation in D.C. public schools unconstitutional. The ruling struck down the "separate but equal" doctrine in the nation's capital, setting a precedent that education was a right owed equally to every child.

However, desegregation did not occur overnight. It took years of community pressure, court oversight, and brave families like the Williamses to move the process forward. Wheatley Elementary officially integrated in 1957, marking a significant step in the District's slow march toward equality.

Today, Wheatley continues to stand as a symbol of progress, community, and the long struggle to ensure that all children—regardless of race—can learn side by side with equal opportunity and dignity.

- Partnerships with Agencies and Organizations: Collaboration with DPR, DPW, DOEE, and local nonprofits strengthened neighborhood infrastructure, safety, and environmental stewardship.
- Health and Resource Fair. Collaborated with 20 agencies at an event to bring resources to Hechinger Mall/Starburst Plaza.



Residents are encouraged to share photos, stories, and memories from these and other community projects to help continue documenting and celebrating the life of ANC 5D.

Looking Ahead: Goals for the Coming Year

As ANC 5D moves into the next year, our focus remains on building stronger, safer, and more connected neighborhoods. The Commission has outlined the following goals for FY2026:

- **Strengthening Transparency and Communication Across SMDs:**
We will continue to improve channels for resident engagement, ensuring that all Single Member Districts (5D01–5D09) receive timely updates on Commission activities, committee work, and city initiatives. This includes expanding digital communications, holding neighborhood forums, and encouraging residents to attend ANC and committee meetings.

- **Expanding Roll-Off and Bulk Trash Programs:**
Building on the success of past community cleanup and roll-off events, ANC 5D will partner with DPW to increase access to bulk trash disposal, reduce illegal dumping, and support neighborhood beautification. We aim to host more events, reaching every block and alley in the Commission area to promote a cleaner, safer environment.
- **Supporting Affordable Housing and Equitable Growth:**
The Commission will continue to advocate for responsible development that balances growth with the needs of current residents. This includes supporting projects that provide affordable housing, ensure community benefits, and preserve the character and diversity of neighborhoods throughout ANC 5D.
- **Hosting the First Annual 5D Garden Walk:**
Next year, ANC 5D will organize a Garden Walk in collaboration with DC Natives, showcasing resident gardens, native plantings, and sustainable landscaping. This event will highlight neighborhood pride, foster environmental awareness, and encourage residents to take an active role in beautifying public and private spaces.
- **Enhancing Environmental and Infrastructure Advocacy:**
We will continue to engage with city agencies and residents on initiatives that improve environmental quality, infrastructure maintenance, and sustainability. Key focus areas include tree planting, stormwater management, traffic and street safety improvements, and programs that address air quality, noise, and other environmental justice concerns.

These goals reflect ANC 5D's commitment to resilience, community engagement, and tangible improvement in the quality of life for all residents. By working together, the Commission and the community can build a stronger, cleaner, and more connected ANC 5D.
