Wednesday, February 11, 2026, 7pm

Introductions: Determination of Quorum and Community Welcome began at approximately 7:00 PM with 7 of 7 Commissioners present: Jeremiah Foxwell (6C01); Karen Wirt (6C02); Jay Adelstein (6C03); Mark Eckenwiler (6C04); Daniela McNerney (6C05); Andrew Hayes (6C06); Tony Goodman (6C07). Commissioner Eckenwiler oriented attendees to functions of the WebEx meeting platform.

Approval of Agenda: An updated agenda was publicly posted to the ANC website prior to the meeting. Request to add an item to the agenda regarding a Hill Rag advertising expense in the Treasurer's Report. Motion by Wirt to approve the agenda as amended: Unanimous **7-0-0**.

Approval of January Minutes: A draft of the minutes for the January 2026 meeting was circulated for review to commissioners and posted on ANC 6C website, no corrections received to the publicly posted draft. Motion by Hayes to approve the minutes: Unanimous **7-0-0**.

Treasurer's Report: Commissioner Adelstein summarized three voting items and an accounting of January expenses.

- Incurred expenses for advertising to inform neighbors of our meetings and public access to the ANC 6C website. Motion by Adelstein to approve the advertising expense: Unanimous **7-0-0**.
- Request for approval of ANC 6C's Quarterly Financial Report for Q1 2026 (Oct-Dec. 2025). Motion by Adelstein to approve: Unanimous **7-0-0**.
- OANC requested formal approval of the 2026 Budget, which was previously circulated and discussed; however minutes of the October 2025 Meeting do not reflect a formal vote. Motion by Adelstein to approve the 2026 Budget previously circulated: Unanimous: **7-0-0**.

Commissioner Announcements

Foxwell (6C01): Described serious concerns with DC government response to snowfall and ice packs over the past month. Councilmember Allen's office and Mayor's team have been responsive to requests for assistance. However, serious issues persist and harm neighbors. Buses from JO Wilson were delayed for two hours with children onboard, and residents of 6C01 (and other SMDs) have not received trash or recycling pickup for four weeks. Despite repeated DPW updates stating that alley service was restored, problems persist. Commissioner Foxwell emphasized the need for improved city response and communication.

Wirt (6C02): No announcements

Adelstein (6C03):

- Noted plans for Mardi Gras on H Street.
- NE Branch of Public Library undergoing heating issues for the past week.

Eckenwiler (6C04): Recommended that neighbors report trash collection issues to the “Complaint Truck” line (202-576-9004) as well as 311. DPW requests 311 reports to track systemic issues, but the Complaint Truck will actually respond to one or a series of calls to address missed collections, etc.

McInerney (6C05):

- Stakeholders held an informational meeting on February 2, 2026 to describe options and benefits of forming a Business Improvement District for the H Street area.
- ACL Committee Member Annette Lee is stepping down, and Commissioner McInerney will sit on the Committee.

Hayes (6C06):

- Update on 201 K Street NE: Banneker Ventures reports construction will resume in March and complete in October, with sidewalk access restored in September; significant delay from report at January Meeting, and neighbors are concerned about the prolonged lack of sidewalk access in the area, as well as blockage of a bike lane while construction is ongoing.
- Update on FOIA Requests: Mayor’s Office failed to provide a substantive response to requests regarding deployment of National Guard units, cooperation with immigration enforcement, and direction to MPD on multiple topics. Lack of response is concerning and may indicate noncompliance with DC law and federal statutes (e.g., DC Law 23-282, Title 49 of the DC Code, and 32 U.S.C. § 502). Recent news reports indicate other DC residents and advocacy groups are asking similar questions, particularly on immigration enforcement, and are also not receiving answers. Intend to offer a resolution to send to the Mayor’s Office on this topic at the March ANC Meeting, while appealing the effective denial of the ANC’s FOIA Requests.
 - Noah Bryce Glasgow of the Mayor’s Office for Community Services took down ANC requests for follow-up on two specific questions regarding; (1) local “operational control” over National Guard units, which Joint Task Force DC says it relies on to guide its work; and (2) direction to MPD Officers regarding compliance with DC Law 23-282.

Goodman (6C07): No announcements

DC Agency Announcements

Jen DeMayo – Constituent Services for Councilmember Charles Allen

- Snow & Trash: High volume of incoming requests for assistance; Councilmember Allen is speaking with DPW about an expedited schedule and expanded resources. Issues reported by neighbors are serious and response has been unacceptable, impacted neighbors are encouraged to reach out with any issues. Thanks to Commissioner Foxwell for his diligence.
- DC Tax Code: Congress considering invalidating certain measures in DC’s tax laws (e.g., local child tax credit); any federal actions would be incredibly disruptive to the DC budget and tax filing procedures.

- Potomac River Sewage Break: No impacts on drinking water at this time, the break is downstream of the drinking water intake. DC Water estimates complete repair in 4-6 weeks. Separate from the break, an overflow is ongoing due to build up of non-soluble material.
- Residential Solar: Councilmember Allen will introduce legislation to reform solar regulations, with the goal of improving predictability and transparency around actual costs and timing of installation.
 - Commissioner Eckenwiler noted that the ANC wrote to Councilmember Allen's office several years ago about issues with solar interconnections and credits, and proposed a zoning framework to permit cross-property installations to avoid zoning issues. Ms. DeMayo welcomed follow-up on this topic, including with Connor Fagan, although the draft legislation is directed to other topics.

Noah Bryce Glasgow – Community Outreach and Relations for Mayor Muriel Bowser

- Snow & Trash: Shelter hotline available at 202-399-7093, encourage neighbors to call to support anyone exposed to the elements. Mayor's Office of Community Resources is flagging uncleared alleys for DPW; reports with photos submitted to 311 are helpful to pass along. Thanks to Commissioner Foxwell for his diligence.

Public Comment

Community Member Commentary - Brad Smith

- Expressed concern and disappointment with DC response to snow emergency, including with timeliness and accuracy of responses to serious issues by DPW and other services.
- Requested advocacy by ANC and options for neighbors to help.
- Commissioner Eckenwiler noted that the functions and powers of the ANC may be less effective in addressing city-wide or regional issues of this nature, and that Councilmembers with oversight authority are better positioned to demand answers and programmatic changes; encouraged outreach to Jenn DeMayo and Councilmember Allen's office with specific concerns or suggestions.

Consent Calendar

Planning, Zoning, and Economic Development Committee (Mark Eckenwiler, Chair)

1. 511 Third Street NE (BZA 21411)—Application for a special exception from lot occupancy requirements to demolish an existing one-story rear addition and construct a two-story rear addition on an existing semi-detached two-story + cellar principal dwelling unit. Committee voted unanimously to recommend support, based on a lack of anticipated substantial adverse impacts to adjacent properties, and letters of support from neighbors to the north, east, and south.

2. 654 L Street NE (BZA 21413)—Application for special exceptions from rear addition requirements and lot occupancy requirements to construct a three-story + roof deck rear addition to an existing attached two-story + cellar principal dwelling unit. One member expressed concern about the size of the rear addition. Committee voted to recommend support based on letters of support from adjoining properties, and studies showing modest shade impacts.
3. 626 A Street NE (HPA 26-150)—Application for concept approval to construct a second-floor addition to an existing one-story garage. Committee voted unanimously to recommend support based on consistency with historic standards, and post-meeting confirmation that the garage post-dated the period of significance.

Transportation and Public Space Committee (Michael Upright, Chair)

1. Capitol Hill Classic request for support—Jayme Johnson. Request for a letter of support to the DC Homeland Security and Emergency Management Agency for a race scheduled for the morning of May 17, 2026. The event will serve children of local schools in ANC 6C. Committee voted unanimously to recommend support.
2. Sidewalk Palooza, project to report and reduce sidewalk hazards—Scott Price. Request for support of a weeklong event (March 21-29) encouraging and organizing reports of sidewalk safety issues. Committee voted unanimously to recommend support (e.g., on the ANC 6C website).

Alcohol and Cannabis Licensing Committee (Drew Courtney)

1. Tango Pastry, ABRA-134324, 408 H Street NE, Application for retailer’s Class “D” restaurant, including stipulated license. Committee voted unanimously to recommend a protest pending a settlement agreement, with Michael Upright designated as representative, pursuant to the grounds laid out in DC Code 25-313.

Grants Committee (Victoria Lord, Chair)

1. No business this month.

Commissioner Wirt moves to approve all items on the consent calendar consistent with the Committee recommendations: Unanimous, **6-0-0** on Support for Capitol Hill Classic with Commissioner Goodman recused; **7-0-0** on remaining items.
