Introductions: Determination of Quorum and Community Welcome began at approximately 7:00 PM with 6 of 7 Commissioners present: Jeremiah Foxwell (6C01); Karen Wirt (6C02); Jay Adelstein (6C03); Daniela McInerney (6C05); Andrew Hayes (6C06); Tony Goodman (6C07). Mr. Michael Upright acted as host to fill in for Commissioner Eckenwiler, and oriented attendees to functions of the WebEx meeting platform.

Approval of Agenda: An updated agenda was publicly posted to the ANC website prior to the meeting. Motion by Wirt to approve the agenda as posted: Unanimous **6-0-0**.

Approval of February Minutes: A draft of the minutes for the February 2026 meeting was circulated for review to commissioners and posted on ANC 6C website, no corrections received to the publicly posted draft. Motion by Hayes to approve the minutes with allowance for correction of errors: Unanimous **6-0-0**.

Treasurer's Report: Commissioner Adelstein provided an update on the monthly report, with little activity and one outstanding check payable to Hill Rag. Motion by Adelstein to approve an expense for web domain services of \$32.36, reimbursing Commissioner Eckenwiler: Unanimous **6-0-0**.

Commissioner Announcements

Foxwell (6C01): No announcements

Wirt (6C02): Attended Office of Planning Open House for H Street Corridor, appreciated presentation but would appreciate more engagement by DDOT representative regarding prioritizing pedestrian safety. The presentation discussed H Street as major throughfare and freeway to RFK Stadium, and advocacy is needed to ensure pedestrian safety is accounted for.

Adelstein (6C03): Reminder that "Sidewalk Palooza" begins March 21; constituents welcome to participate in campaign to report sidewalk safety issues and irregularities, to be collected by the Capitol Hill Village subcommittee of the city-wide Sidewalk Palooza campaign.

McInerney (6C05): Working with Officer Lewis of MPD to put together an April community walk for 6C05, invitation extended to DDOT, maybe a good opportunity to press on land use accounting for pedestrians.

Hayes (6C06): No announcements

Goodman (6C07): Thanks to Chair Wirt for report on open house, agree with objective to prioritize pedestrian safety.

- 300 L Street: Railings on the sidewalk have finally been removed. Thanks to advocacy by neighbors, the Mayor's Office, Charles Allen's Office; unfortunate that it took so much energy by so many people, but grateful for the resolution.

- ACE Hardware incoming to ANC 6C07, coming soon sign is posted.

DC Agency Announcements

Quentin Floyd – J.O. Wilson Modernization

- Completed Work:
 - Terrazo on third floor
 - Metal paneling on exterior
- Ongoing Work:
 - Mechanical and plumbing, taking place on levels 2-3.
 - Remaining terrazzo installation, roof anchors, façade installation on new building.
- Upcoming Work:
 - Permanent power installation
 - South side façade, tiling
 - Site demolition for field and playground, which will be offline till school is back in session.
- Mr. Floyd will follow-up with Commissioner Foxwell to determine if permits will need to be extended beyond current dates. Currently, the authorization to work until 11p in the building expires March 31.
- DCPS Night at Nats is coming up in April, students and staff welcome to attend.
- Enrollment Saturday is coming up, families encouraged to enroll for upcoming year.

Tre Bracey – Mayor’s Office of Community Relations & Services

- Provided an update on pending legislation and regulatory efforts:
 - Supporting Local Business Enterprises Amendment Act - intended to cut red tape for certified business enterprises.
 - Procurement Reform Amendment Act – intended to deliver services faster, protect taxpayers, and open doors to local businesses, including by permitting review of contracts while the relevant entities are in recess.
 - Prohibition on self-subcontracting to expand access
- Per DMPSJ, no updates on ANC 6C’s pending FOIA request on federal law enforcement efforts, guidance to National Guard units, and immigration enforcement.

Public Comment

DC Budget Summary – Councilmember Charles Allen

Each Spring, Councilmember Allen visits ANC meetings to share updates on the Council and the City:

- Tax Season Clarifications: Congressional action attempting to align DC’s local tax code with the federal code was ineffective for the current filing season, based on an opinion by the DC Office of the Chief Financial Officer and DC Office of the Attorney General. Helpful to provide certainty to DC residents that they will not need to refile, and this avoids budget cuts and last minute modifications to the DC tax code.

- H Street Land Use Open House drew strong community interest, with a focus on prioritizing pedestrian improvements and safety along the corridor.
- DC Streetcar service will end in March; DDOT has no current transition plan for infrastructure removal (e.g., shelter removal, stanchions, branding, catenary wires). or replacement transit services. Funding for RFK redevelopment may provide additional funds for replacement transit services, but will take years to complete. Intending to press DDOT for interim solutions.
- Utility rates have significantly increased; the Council is pursuing further oversight and considering legislation to facilitate residential solar adoption. Assistance program eligibility is being streamlined for SNAP and TANF recipients. Planning to hold more oversight hearings to ensure rate hikes are not excessive.
- Community members invited to join upcoming initiatives include Sidewalk Palooza and the citywide spring clean on April 25.
- Reiterated opposition to MPD coordination with ICE and reported on recent transparency legislation regarding body-worn camera footage. City efforts to manage federal law enforcement collaboration are ongoing, but city officials are constrained in managing federal law enforcement efforts, and do not have legislative authority to directly control federal agents.
- Community members reminded to refer to bi-monthly updates from Councilmember Allen’s office, and to sign up if not already receiving them

FOIA Update – Andrew Hayes, Secretary ANC 6C

In general, ANC 6C’s Freedom of Information Act requests to multiple city and federal agencies have received deficient responses. Notably:

- **National Guard / Joint Task Force DC** provided substantive responses but no underlying documents. JTF DC claims that “operational control remains local, while mission tasking and funding are Federal.” Representatives failed to respond to requests for clarification on the meaning of “operational control” and what local entities are providing it.
- **Mayor’s Office of Deputy Mayor for Public Safety and Justice** provided an inadequate response to specific requests, and has only produced a copy of Mayor’s Order 2025-090, which was already referenced in the FOIA Requests.
- **Metropolitan Police Department** failed to provide a written response after providing an oral update that MPD would hold any federal counterparts to the same standards of conduct as MPD uses for itself.

ANC 6C is submitting administrative appeals to the Mayor’s Office (DMPSJ) and MPD, requesting expedited productions of documents to address two key questions:

1. What is the nature and substance of local “operational control” over National Guard units operating under Joint Task Force DC?
2. What direction has been provided to MPD Officers regarding cooperation with federal immigration enforcement?

Consent Calendar

Transportation and Public Space Committee (Michael Upright, Chair)

1. DDOT, NOI 26-35-TOA, no parking zone, 70. ft. addition to west side of 1st Street NE for trash removal and deliveries to the Union Station loading dock
 - Unanimous committee support for conversion of parking spaces to a commercial loading zone to improve access by commercial vehicles and limit blockages of the roadway for trash pickup, etc.

Alcohol and Cannabis Licensing Committee (Drew Courtney)

1. Viet Pho Restaurant, 333 H Street NE, ABRA-116771, Class C restaurant, new application
 - Committee supported a protest of license renewal based on lack of adherence to the settlement agreement implemented with the approval of the license (reports of improper disposal of cooking oil).
2. The Little Grand, 808 7th Street NE, ABRA-110495, Class C tavern, application for streatory
 - Committee supported the implementation of a streatory; location of the restaurant in a back alley with no homes nearby makes it unlikely to create any disruption, and the Committee did not identify any issues with the application.
